


Stop Eton College building a huge 3,000-house new town in idyllic, open countryside right on the border of the South Downs National Park and Biosphere Reserve.

## Wrong scheme, wrong place

The proposed new town is on a huge scale that is not supported by local housing needs. There is no existing infrastructure for a development of this size with water abstraction, flooding, sewage, pollution and traffic all of huge concern. Previous assessments recommended zero building growth in this area and deemed the proposed site 'not suitable' and 'not deliverable or developable'. The scheme could mean 3.5 million more car journeys a year on tiny country lanes - from some 6.000 additional residents and an estimated 4.200 extra vehicles.

#### This loss of green space would:

- Destroy the landscape of the South Downs forever
- Destroy precious habitat & ecosystems, home to numerous protected species
- Cause huge congestion and add more pressure on surrounding villages and towns

The ecological impact of concreting over this special downland area would be devastating and irreversible. The South Downs National Park Character Assessment describes the area as "a deeply rural landscape ... a mosaic of farmland and woodland." There are numerous protected animal species including bats, Great Crested Newts, the Hazel Dormouse and 22 Red Listed bird species as well as rare butterflies. bees and moths. The Bevern Chalk stream is also a prolific spawning ground to a nationally significant sea trout population.
